


Four newly minted architecture firms are packing some major talent



firm On graduating with a master's in architecture from Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York, Antonio Sofan returned to his native Colombia—only to decamp again later to escape the country's economic crisis. He spent seven years at several large multidisciplinary firms in Philadelphia, designing buildings and interiors, while continuing to take Colombian commissions on the side. Now, he works on his own as the Antonio Sofan Architecture and Interiors Studio as well as teaching at Notre Dame University's Lebanon campus and the Colegiatura Colombiana in Medellín, Colombia. His lectures emphasize principles of sustainability, while his architecture takes the green agenda home.
